Finding out that I was pregnant was completely shocking to me. I was nervous, scared, and I felt like I wasn't qualified to be a mother. There are no instructions to be a mother. I also thought "I'm not financially stable," "I haven't graduated college," and "my boyfriend and I don't have our own place." I want to have a home to raise my baby in and not live with ten plus people.

I was scared to tell anybody, even my boyfriend, Xephoniah. Even though he had suspicions about my pregnancy (due to my cravings of Oreos and pickles), I just didn't know how he was going to react. I was terrified to tell my mother. My anxiety rushed through me and that held me back from telling her, so I told my grandma first. My grandma is not only my grandma, but like a mom and my best friend. I could tell that she was excited. She was so excited that she told my grandpa. My mom had a feeling that something was going on, like any other moms' instincts would. She had a feeling I was pregnant. When I told her, I could tell she was disappointed. She had high hopes and dreams for me since I was the baby of three and was attending Santa Fe Indian School, a magnificent boarding school for 7th to 12th graders. But she said she would help in any way she could and that put me into tears. My whole life was going to change.

I told my friend Stephanie that I was pregnant, and she gladly took me to Grace Place Pregnancy and Health Center. She told me that Grace Place is an organization that helps mothers. I felt comfortable going with Stephanie because she is like a mother figure to me and really supported me. I needed that support and I thank God for her. While we sat in the waiting area, I was scared and full of anxiety. My thoughts were racing ... "What will they say?" "Will they judge me because I am a young mom?" It was the total opposite! The first time I met Lucia a weight was lifted off my shoulders. She met with me, showed me around and told me all about the services Grace Place offered. I was surprised, Grace Place even does ultrasounds! Everyone

girl. My pregnancy was considered high risk because my cervix was short. I had the fear of my cervix opening in my second trimester. To make matters worse, I was working as a housekeeper at the hospital. During this time, I was also attending parenting classes regularly at Grace Place. Although they didn't eliminate the fears I was having, it was nice when I would come in because they were always encouraging me and telling me everything was going to be ok. They also prayed for me.

As time went on, I had many appointments to monitor my baby and my cervix. Not only was I worried, my doctors were as well. They were afraid I would miscarry or go into preterm labor. At 22 weeks I was put on medical leave from work. This whole thing was new to me and nothing they told me made sense, as if it were another language. I obviously wanted my pregnancy to go full term. I told myself that "I am going to ball out in tears when this baby is born!"

Even though I was going through all of this, every time I would hear my baby's heartbeat or see her on the ultrasound screen move, jump up and down, or suck her thumb it was all worth it. I loved watching her when she was being difficult for the sonographer. She would melt my heart. Words cannot describe my love for her. I first learned that I was having a little girl during an ultrasound at the Shiprock Hospital. I was so very excited! I just cried and told Xephoniah that I could not wait to dress her up in cute little clothes, do her hair and even pamper her by painting her nails.

Through my pregnancy it made me trust God a lot more. I had no choice but to put everything in His hands. Knowing that He has a plan for me. He will take care of my little family. He will provide for us no matter how hard the road may be. He will lay down the path for my family and me. Jesus said, "With God all things are possible" (Matthew 19:26).

The people at Grace Place immensely care and love every individual, every mother, every father and every child. I have connected and made friends with loving and caring folks. I am so grateful for Grace Place. I learned so much through their parenting program. I learned about what goes on first, second and the third trimester. All the classes prepared me to have this baby. Xephoniah and I also earned "baby bucks" for taking the parenting classes and doing assignments. With the baby bucks, I was able to get maternity clothes as well as other items for my baby girl. This place is amazing, and I truly recommend it. Thank you God for Grace Place! Today, Xephoniah and I have a happy, healthy beautiful 3-month-old baby girl named Xaviera Raffaella. Xaviera means bright and splendid. Rafaella means God has healed.

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
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Jamie Mead:

To know my heart, you must know my story. I am the 3rd generation, born and raised right here in Farmington. I was a fat happy baby born almost eight years after my sister, who was born to teenage parents. In the summer of 1987, my parents divorced. My mom, sister and I moved into a cute house across the street from my elementary school and not long after we moved in, I was diagnosed with diabetes. I wouldn't know this until I was older, but my mother was told by the doctor that the best thing she could do was to not treat me any different. Well, I was treated different. My family was more protective. I missed out on slumber parties and of course my peers didn't understand and ended up treating me different. However, I did enjoy playing sports, dancing and travelling when I was young.

I have always struggled with my mortality. At 8, I considered dying. It was around this time that I really remember my relationship with GOD starting to form. We were not regular church goers until I was about 11 years old, but I talked to GOD most nights before drifting off to sleep. You see, it was really GOD and my mom that kept me alive. As I grew and we learned more about diabetes and all that could or would happen, I never really thought that I would live long, but I hung on to my dreams of a career and family. I started serving others (volunteering) when I was about 12 years old. I had a passion to help with anything I could. I helped at church with communion and Vacation Bible School. I tutored other students. I babysat. Over the years, this turned into coaching cheerleading, teaching Sunday school, raising money and awareness for diabetes, and helping with Sunday services. I became someone who was reliable and good, so I just continued to get involved in my community. As an adult, diabetes is still not an excuse and I live to the fullest. However, not having children has been a heart wrenching, overwhelming, conscious decision that I often regret. This was not a decision that was made lightly or sometimes even by my own choice but diabetes and all the worries that brings for both mom and baby won. Why not adoption you may ask, well frankly, it's just too expensive and fraught with its own complications.

At 22, the Lord released me from a deep pit of depression. A soothing peace filled me as I was given this revelation; If God is gracious enough to give me another day then I will be gracious enough to get up out of bed and live. Not every day is good, but God is and therefore every day is a chance for me to be His light.

I was first introduced to Grace Place through their baby bottle fundraiser at church. I didn't really know much about them other than they were pro-life, and I could totally get behind that. See, I love babies. I have no children of my own so if I could help bring life into this world, I was on board. A couple of years later, my sister talked me into being a church liaison; even if it was so she could compete with me. The kick-off for what would be the 2nd Annual Steps4Life, was my first real introduction to the organization and the work they were doing in our community. I have fallen in love with Grace Place. It has given me an outlet for my longing to be a mother. I may not have children, but I know without a doubt that no matter the circumstances, a baby is a blessing. I may not get the blessing of a child, but I can be a champion for the little souls who have come to this world to bless their birthparents or adoptive parents.

God gave me a heart of service. I can only hope that others see the love and mercy of GOD through my actions and witness. My personal life has been messy, like most people, but there is no mess too big that God can't turn into a message.

I believe that God has a purpose and plan for all of us. Jeremiah 29:11 reminds me of this. I could cry out to the Lord in anger (and I have) for allowing me to have diabetes when I was so little. But you know what, I wouldn't change it. If I look back, this life sentence has helped shape many in my life. My sister is a nurse, my parents were forced to work together after their divorce, and I have two childhood friends that say my diabetes influenced their career choice. Our heartaches sometimes are not really for us but to help shape those around us. We never know who or how we may impact someone else's story! Serving Grace Place is a wonderful way to touch lives without them ever knowing.



I genuinely gave my heart to the Lord, when I was 15 years old. I was two months pregnant with my daughter Gabrielle. I traveled to Indiana with our Pastor and Youth Pastor to attend a weeklong youth camp. We were gone for 3 weeks. While at the youth retreat many messages were shared. To this day, I remember two of the titles. One was "How to Break Your Mothers Heart" and the other was "One More Night with the Frogs." Sitting there listening to the speaker share, I remember talking to myself in my head, "Yep, I have done that, I have broken my mothers' heart. Yep, I am not ready to commit my whole life to the Lord." At that point, I realized that I didn't want my child to see me live in sin, no matter what. I wanted my child to experience a better life than I had as a child. I wanted my child to know the Lord and have no part of evil. So, in May 1992, I made a commitment to serve God, no matter what!

Over the years, I have been able to see the importance of having a strong support system in my own life. I feel

very fortunate that God blessed me with a family that has supported me in everything. I feel an overwhelming desire to support places like Grace Place. Grace Place provides the kind of support that I was given by my family to the community at large especially for those that do not get the support from their families. This is very important to God's work on the Earth because many will never step into a church to hear the word. Some will only hear the word of God by seeing it shared with them through ministries like Grace Place.

Grace Place has been a part of my family's life for over 10 years now. We have felt led to support this ministry because we feel Grace Place plays a vital role in God's work in this community and we are also able to care for some of the children Grace Place saves. God has blessed many with an anointing to minister to families. My family and I also have a heart to serve and help families while spreading the gospel.

In our community of Bloomfield, there were no licensed childcare facilities in 2007. Families relied on family



and friends to watch their children. For families with no relatives in the area, they were forced to drive 10 to 20 minutes away to neighboring towns to find childcare for their children. This was very time consuming as well as expensive for families.

God began working in my heart the summer of 2007. I was really feeling led to do something to help families. I was not sure what I could do to help, so I continued to pray and seek God. Fortunately, in the fall of 2007, God led me to open a home daycare and to call it, Love the Children Learning Center. I started as a registered home able to care for six children. Four months later, I applied for a license to care for twelve children and filled up within the month. The home daycare stayed full three and a half years and the income provided for me and paid wages for two employees.

In 2011, my own children started entering junior high and high school. So, I decided it was time to close the home daycare and look for other employment. I gave all my daycare families a six-week notice to find other care. During this process, I contacted a local daycare owner. I shared with her my plans and she listened. At the end of my story, she asked me if I would consider staying open if I could get the daycare out of my house. This sparked my curiosity, and I told her maybe why? She went on to offer me an alternative to my dilemma. What if you buy out one of my daycare facilities and move your home daycare out of your home and into the facility. She presented me with an offer that had entirely no risk on my part. After lots of prayer and speaking with my parents and grandmother, I decided to take her up on her offer.

The new center was licensed for 42 children, and it filled up within three to four months and had a waiting list. In the spring of 2012, I started looking around town for a building that would work well for a second daycare. I found a building that was affordable, but unlike the first building this one was not move in ready. This building would take

some remodeling work to get in to. We spent a little over a year remodeling it ourselves to meet state regulations and our own needs. The building was basically gutted. All that was left were the walls, roof and concrete floor. We put in a new ceiling, new plumbing, new heating and air conditioning, new doors, new electric and fixtures, new bathrooms and a new kitchen area. We painted the floors and walls. It was unrecognizable when we finished. We opened the doors the summer of 2013. The Big Kids Center was licensed for 38 children. That same summer we started the food program through the USDA and set up a small kitchen at both schools to prepare meals on site for the children.

God continues stretching us and growing us larger and larger. In the summer of 2015, the bakery that was preparing our hot foods announced that they were closing by the fall. Again, God moved and allowed us to purchase the bakery to house our food program. It was not in my plans to manage the bakery but the manager we hired bailed the first month, so I ended up stepping in. This was a lot for me when added to my already full plate from the two daycares. I prayed and asked God each day to give me strength to carry this cross. Some days were harder than

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others, but God carried all of us through this season. After two years I finally told my husband that I just couldn't do it anymore. We started looking for a building that could fit the two daycares with a kitchen, so we could close the bakery. There were no buildings in Bloomfield that had everything we required. We expanded our search and contacted a realtor.

We looked at a few buildings in Bloomfield and Aztec. We found a building that we could remodel to meet our needs and put earnest money down. As we began taking steps

towards purchasing the building, God brought information to the surface that kept us from making a very big mistake. The building was in a flood plain and had flooded many times over the past 30 years. We backed out of the deal and later found a building in Aztec that met our needs. This building would take us in a much different direction, but God's ways are not always our ways. We put a deposit down on a 5-year lease. We began the renovation process the fall of 2017. We were able to close the bakery in December 2017 and open the new kitchen in Aztec January 2018. The actual school renovations took us longer than expected pushing our opening date back to February 20, 2018.

We opened and were licensed for 63 at the Aztec site. We applied for FOCUS within a few months and were able to get Verified for our 3-Star in May 2019, our 4-Star in June 2019 and our 5-Star in August 2019. It usually takes most centers years to get accredited at 5-Star, but with God's grace we were able to get our accreditation within 18 months.

God has a plan for the daycares, just as he has a plan for Grace Place. We are honored to be a part of what He is doing in the Four Corners Community. He loves children and families and wants them to hear His word through His people.

- Approximately 45% of New Mexico woman who give birth, do so after an unintended pregnancy.
- 57% of babies born in San Juan County are to single women.
- In America, 1 baby is aborted every 25 seconds, making it the leading cause of death in our country.
- In 2010, 47% of women in America said that their pregnancy was unintended. 4 out of 10 of these were terminated by abortion.
- In 2014, 59% of women in America who chose abortion had at least 1 previous birth.
- Women who visit Grace Place for their pregnancy test often comment that “they were grateful someone was there to listen to them and not judge.”
- The families who have been involved in our Earn While You Learn Program often say “The ladies at Grace Place are like family to us.”

Turn on the news and it's easy to find stories and features regarding the issue of life. There are so many presidential candidates showing their support for abortion-on-demand up until, and even beyond, a child's birth. Some states are moving to "codify" *Roe v. Wade*, passing liberal abortion laws which might have shocked many of the justices who gave us *Roe* in 1973. At the same time, other states are passing laws to directly challenge *Roe*, setting off massive boycotts and unhinged rhetoric.

What about us? How does this affect those who visit Grace Place Pregnancy and Health Center? While we occasionally hear one of our clients bring up something, they noticed in the media regarding the life issue, the simple truth is, decisions in Washington or in state houses across the country are rarely on the radar of those we see.

Those who come in our door are often hurting over a relationship, struggling with their own situations and trying to figure out, "What do I do now?" They are not worried

about what the Supreme Court may decide—or not decide—in the future. Because right now, she (and often he, too) is in a crisis. Right now, she needs answers. Right now, she needs someone who will listen, who is ready to take her by the hand and walk through the storm with her, who will bring hope to what seems a hopeless situation.

This is our calling. This is our mission at-hand. What goes on in Washington or in our state house certainly impacts our work—no doubt about it. But as speculation and rhetoric swirls about us, our next steps are as clear today as the day we opened our doors 30 years ago. We reach out to those in a frighteningly difficult situation. We offer life-affirming hope. We share the love of Christ. We bring practical help. We stand beside those who call on us and we encourage them. It's what we do.

Many—if not all of us—can look back on our lives and find a moment where someone encouraged us; a seemingly small moment which achieved great impact on our journey in this thing called life.

Our ministry, in its simplest terms, is one of love and

encouragement. Ours is not to argue, to debate or to direct. No, we're about encouragement. For some who come in our door, all they need is for someone to say, "You can do this." And they choose life. For others, we go the next step; offering, "And we will be with you every step of the way." Many of these too, choose life.

There are many factors involved, of course. We're not trying to over-simplify what we do. But at our core, we are encouragers. At our core, we are those who come alongside; who roll up our sleeves and get messy if we need to do so.



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
